

Workshop and conference announcements

43ACC December 2021

Postponed from December 2020 due to COVID, the 43rd Australasian Combinatorics Conference (43ACC) will be held at The University of Melbourne, Australia, 13–17 December 2021. It is the next conference of the Combinatorial Mathematics Society of Australasia, in the otherwise annual series formerly referred to as the Australasian Conference on Combinatorial Mathematics and Combinatorial Computing (ACCMCC). The conference programme will include invited talks, contributed talks in parallel sessions, a presentation of the CMSA Anne Penfold Street Student Prize for the best student talk at the conference, and the CMSA Annual General Meeting. Depending on COVID related rules on social gatherings, a conference dinner and an excursion may be scheduled as well. Researchers in any area of discrete mathematics and its applications are warmly invited to attend and contribute.

The 2020 Gavin Brown Prize of the Australian Mathematical Society was awarded to John Bamberg, Michael Giudici, Gordon Royle (all Department of Mathematics and Statistics, UWA) for their paper: Every flock generalized quadrangle has a hemisystem, *Bulletin of the London Mathematical Society*, 42 (2010) 795–810. Citation.

Jesse Lansdown has been awarded a PhD in Dec 2020 for his thesis *Designs in Finite Geometry*, which was supervised by John Bamberg (UWA), Alice Niemeyer (RWTH Aachen University, Germany) and Gordon Royle (UWA). He was the second successful student under an ongoing cotutelle agreement between RWTH Aachen and UWA. Jesse has started a postdoctoral fellowship on an ARC grant held by John Bamberg, Michael Giuidici and Gordon Royle.

Congratulations to Cheryl Praeger who was awarded Australias highest civilian honour, Companion of the Order of Australia (AC) on 26 January 2021 for her eminent service to mathematics, and to tertiary education, as a leading academic and researcher, to international organisations, and as a champion of women in STEM careers. Congratulations to Jennifer Seberry who was awarded the 2020 Pearcey Medal on 25 November in recognition of a distinguished lifetime achievement and contribution to the development and growth of the Information and Communications Technology (ICT) industry in Australia. The award was given by the Pearcey Foundation, which was formed in 1998 in memory of Trevor Pearcey, an Australian ICT pioneer who led the construction of CSIRAC, one of the world's earliest computers.
